

Featuring a regal Ecuadorian Connecticut wrapper, a luscious Sumatran binder and a filler blend of Dominican Criollo '98 and Nicaraguan Criollo '98 and Corojo '99 tobaccos, Undercrown Shade is medium-bodied and ultrasmooth offering notes of cream with lush hints of vanilla, caramel and pepper.

Hi Romy, and Fouad, you are celebrating the 10th Anniversary of the brand. Congratulations!

Fouad: Thank you! Celebrating the 10th Anniversary of our brand is truly a milestone, and we are incredibly grateful for the journey that has brought us here.

Did you have a goal in mind that you wanted to reach when you started?

Fouad: When we started, our goal was simple: to create high-quality cigars that embodied our passion for the craft and the values of brotherhood, integrity, and tradition. More than just great cigars, we wanted to build a brand that brought people together and gave back to the community. What started as a fund-raising passion project quickly grew into something much bigger than we anticipated. We saw how deeply our cigars resonated with people-not just within the Masonic communi-


What has been the most significant change you have seen in the business in the last ten years, both good and bad?

Every time someone smokes a Hiram & Solomon cigar, they're not just enjoying a premium blend but also contributing to something greater. This alignment between our brand and our values is what drives us forward. For us, cigars have always been about connection, tradition, and purpose. And if we can use our platform to give back and inspire others to do the same, then we know we're fulfilling the true spirit of Masonry and brotherhood.

Romy, you got more involved in the brand after a while. What prompted that shift, and how has adapting to your role been?

Romy: Initially, my involvement with Hiram & Solomon was more on the business development side, but as the brand grew, I found myself becoming more immersed in its vision, values, and potential. What really prompted the shift was seeing firsthand how deeply our cigars resonated with both Masons and non-Masons alike. The way our products brought people together, sparked conversations and embodied the spirit of brotherhood was truly inspiring. Adapting to my role has been both challenging and rewarding. The cigar industry is unique—it's not just about making a great product, but about building relationships, understanding market trends, and staying true to the brand's identity. Learning the nuances of blending, distribution, and brand positioning has been a continuous journey, but I've been fortunate to work with a great team and have the support of the Masonic community. At the end of the day, seeing the brand flourish and knowing we're making a meaningful impact makes all the hard work worth it.

There are not many couples in the cigar world who are involved in all aspects of the company. How do you manage to balance work and life?

Both: Being a couple deeply involved in every aspect of the cigar business is both a blessing and a challenge. We are constantly working together, whether it's blending, marketing, distribution, or events, so the line between work and personal life can sometimes blur. But what makes it work is our shared passion for what we do. One of the keys to balancing work and life is understanding each other's strengths and allowing space for both professional and personal growth. We've learned to set boundaries where needed, making sure that we still take time to enjoy cigars not just as business owners, but as two people who fell in love over them. At the same time, we embrace the fact that this isn't just a job, but rather a



lifestyle. The cigar world is built on relationships, experiences, and friendships, and we make sure to enjoy those moments rather than just seeing them as work. One of the things we look forward to every day is our smoking ritual-whether it's after long hours in the office, on a plane between destinations, or winding down after an event. That time is sacred for us. It's when we disconnect from everything else, share thoughts, reflect, and just enjoy the moment together. Ultimately, the balance comes from mutual respect, a shared vision, and knowing when to put the work aside and just enjoy a cigar, not as business partners, but as husband and wife.

How's the blending dynamic between the both of you? Do you have different approaches or philosophies when it comes to creating cigars?

Romy: The blending dynamic between us is a fascinating balance of our individual strengths and shared vision. Over time, I've become more involved in the blending process because my palate tends to pick up on more intricate nuances, which allows me to explore deeper layers of complexity in a cigar. I love experimenting with different tobaccos, fine-tuning blends, and crafting cigars that evolve with every puff, offering a memorable experience. My husband and I have different approaches; he's very methodical and precise, ensuring consistency, construction, and burn quality, while I approach blending more intuitively, focusing on how flavors interact and unfold throughout the smoke. I enjoy pushing boundaries and discovering new combinations that surprise and delight smokers. This contrast in our styles actually strengthens the final product. We challenge each other's ideas, refine blends through both technical precision and sensory exploration, and ultimately create cigars that aren't just well-made but tell a story. At the end of the day, our shared passion and complementary skills make the blending process a rewarding and exciting journey."

Fouad: I couldn't agree with Romy's answer more, we both know that the combination of our strengths leads to a better product than we would make individially.

What does the blend for this special occasion represent for you both personally and for the brand's journey?

Both: For us, this blend is more than just a cigar-it's a reflection of our journey, our challenges, and our triumphs over the past 10 years. Every leaf in this cigar tells a story, much like our own. It represents the passion, resilience, and dedication that have gone into building Hiram & Solomon from the ground up. On a personal level, this cigar is a tribute to the sacrifices, late nights, and unwavering belief we've had in this brand. rothers Billy and Gus Fakih have always been on the pulse of the cigar world, be it from their days as retailers of the infamous Cigar Inn stores in New York or as cigar makers under the Artesano Del Tobacco brand. Their success in both ventures stands as a testament to their expertise, vision, and unwavering dedication to the craft. We sat down with them to discuss their journey, passion, and what's next for their brand.

What was your guy's first introduction to cigars?

It all began with our father and grandfather, who both enjoyed smoking cigars. Growing up, our household celebrated significant moments with cigars. These occasions were often filled with laughter and joy, creating lasting memories that we cherish to this day. The aroma of cigars became synonymous with family gatherings.

During our weekend barbecues and special celebrations, cigars were always present. They added a unique touch to our festivities and fostered a sense of connection



among family members. This tradition has been passed down through generations. Thanks to our dad and grandfather, we developed an appreciation for cigars from an early age. Their passion inspired us to explore the world of cigars further, understanding the nuances that make each experience unique.

Before creating your cigar brand, you were on the retail side of the premium cigar business. How did owning a cigar store come to be?

It's quite interesting how we started our cigar journey business; it all began in a quaint gift store located in the West Village of New York. Our evolution has been shaped by our customers' preferences and changing trends. One pivotal moment occurred when a client informed us about his transition from cigarettes to cigars. He expressed interest in purchasing cigars from us if we carried his preferred brand. This sparked our initial foray into the cigar market, starting with just a few boxes. As demand grew, we transformed our entire store into a dedicated cigar shop, ultimately leading to its sale.

In 1992, we relocated uptown and proudly opened New York Cigar Inn, featuring a walk-in humidor—a true milestone for us in creating an authentic cigar lounge experience. Our business continued to flourish, prompting us to expand further. In 2008, my brother Bass joined our venture, allowing us to establish a second location in Midtown Manhattan under the same name—New York Cigar Inn—strengthening our presence in the city. In 2015, Altadis USA approached us for a partnership and acquired both locations. This pivotal moment enabled us to shift our focus towards producing and manufacturing cigars, marking an exciting new chapter for our family business.

After spending more than 20 years in the retail side of premium cigars, you decided in 2019 to launch Artesano Del Tobacco. What changed to make you guys want to start making cigars?

We officially registered our corporation in 2012, marking the beginning of an exciting journey in the cigar industry. In the same year, we registered the name "Viva La Vida" and developed its schematic design. This initial groundwork laid a solid foundation for what would become a unique offering in the market. Our vision was clear from the start: to create exceptional cigars that stand out.

Our introduction to AJ Fernandez Cigars in 2013 was pivotal. We were captivated by his innovative approach and distinctive blends, which set his products apart from others. The refreshing quality of his cigars inspired us to explore new possibilities within our own creations. While our idea of making cigars began in 2012, it wasn't until 2015 that we fully committed ourselves to this passion. After selling our retail cigar lounges, we reached out to AJ Fernandez to collaborate on blending and manufacturing Viva La Vida Cigars, and in 2019, we felt the Viva La Vida



blend reached its maturity and is ready for the market.

Were you able to apply anything you've learned on the retail end to making cigars, and what did you learn now that you own a cigar brand that you wished you would have known earlier?

What we were able to apply from our clients and for being in retail begins with the invaluable insights we gain from them. Their preferences and experiences shape our understanding of the unique blends we enjoy, guiding us in our pursuit of excellence. Initially, we focused on learning about the specific blends that resonate with them. Understanding their preferences for sizes, wrappers, fillers, and binders have allowed us to refine our offerings and cater and focus on tastes more effectively.

As we delved deeper into flavors, finishes, strength, and construction, we recognized that smoking cigars is a nuanced experience. This appreciation has been cultivated through conversations with them and our own experiences as cigar enthusiasts. What we learned is that the craftsmanship behind each cigar is a labor of love that demands time—time for curing and aging. Our commitment to quality means we understand that there are no shortcuts; great cigars cannot be rushed or hurried. The knowledge we've gained from our clients has been instrumental in creating exceptional blends. We remain dedicated to honoring this process while continuously striving to deliver products that reflect both the market and what our clients tell us through their passion for fine cigars.

A couple of things you have to get in line before you have a finished product, especially in the cigar business, is to know where to make the cigars and by whom. Was there a list of countries and producers you wanted to try, and how did you land with AJ Fernandez?

Our collaboration with AJ Fernandez began unexpectedly when his former partner introduced San Lotano Cigars at our New York stores in 2012. At that time, we were unfamiliar with AJ's work. As we sampled the San Lotano Cigars, we were captivated by their exceptional blend. This experience ignited our passion for AJ's creations, ultimately making us one of his most ardent supporters in the industry. Our enthusiasm for his cigars grew immensely from that moment.

When AJ decided to launch his new cigar, New World Connecticut, we proudly hosted its debut from our shops. We organized a sit-down dinner to introduce it to the entire U.S. market, showcasing our commitment to promoting quality cigars and supporting talented artisans like AJ. Collaboration deepened further when we embarked on creating Viva La Vida Cigars together. AJ expressed profound gratitude for our early support during his journey, stating that he would reciprocate our loyalty. His dedication and integrity have solidified a strong bond

between us. His blends resonated with us and aligned perfectly with what the market was seeking at that time. As we embarked on designing the Viva La Vida cigars, collaborating with AJ was an obvious choice. His innovative approach and dedication to crafting exceptional cigars made him the ideal collaborator for our vision. We sought specific flavors and notes that would set our line apart, and AJ rose to the challenge brilliantly. His ability to create unique blends with outstanding construction ensured that our expectations were not only met but exceeded.

The first line you launched was the Viva La Vida and, afterward, the El Pulpo. What's the story behind the names and the logos?

The name embodies the spirit of celebrating life's successes-be it birthdays, weddings, or graduations. We believe every day deserves recognition for your hard work. Viva La Vida cigars serve as a reminder that life is a series of celebrations. You don't need to wait for special occasions; each day is an opportunity to unwind and enjoy the fruits of your labor. We encourage you to take a moment for yourself and savor that well-deserved cigar.

To emphasize this celebratory spirit, we chose a jester design for our logo. The jester symbolizes joy and laughter, reminiscent of childhood visits to amusement parks where happiness was abundant. Our goal is to evoke those same feelings with every cigar you enjoy. Following the success of Viva La Vida, we proudly introduced EL Pulpo cigars. Inspired by the octopus's unique ability to adapt its shape, these cigars represent versatility in flavor and experience. Just like the octopus fits into any space, our blends cater to all preferences.

What is your vision for Artesano Del Tobacco, and what can we expect in the future?

As you know, Artesano Del Tobacco is a boutique cigar company that uniquely blends art and tobacco. Our vision is to honor the talented individuals who craft cigars in our factories and farms. At Artesano Del Tobacco, we believe that these cigar makers behind our products are true artists. Their dedication and craftsmanship inspire us to create exceptional cigars that reflect their skill and passion for the trade. We pride ourselves on using only high-quality, premium tobacco.

Our commitment to excellence ensures that every cigar we produce meets the highest standards of quality, catering to the discerning tastes of our consumers. Guillotina de Saka

"A high profile cigar cutter."

t is a cigar cutter made with no compromises. The design was made by Steve Saka himself, the founder of Dunbarton Tobacco & Trust, and it is manufactured by Luigi Lucente of CigarMedics, in the US.

This cutter is made with custom milled 6061-T6 Aluminum Bolsters, featuring an OD Green Cerakote finish. The logo and writings are gold-filled. The body presents jimping for providing ergonomic grip. When it comes to the mechanism, this product is activated with a magnetic closure/opening, that works smoothly. It is assembled with custom blued screws heat treated to a straw gold color to accent the green hue of the Cerakote finish.

The blade is made of 420 stainless steel, and it can be changed without tools (every Cutter comes with a QR code to access a video on how to change it). The cutter comes, in fact, with an additional blade. The two sides of the cutter are different, offering dual Chamfered Sides, to better fit different ring gauge cigars: one works better with cigars up to 48, while the other with bigger ones. Steve told us he spent well over a year in prototype-making, ending up with testing 150 units to ensure their long-term functionality.

We've been testing this cutter for quite a few months. The design is original, and the product is well-made. It is solid and the blade well sharpened. The ergonomy



is good and the finish make it very appealing to the touch. The mechanism that open and close the blade is extremely smooth and the feeling you have when "playing" with it is satisfying. You can tell this is a high end made product by keeping it in your hand. The weight is on point: solid, but not too heavy.

We tested it with a large variety of cigars, and it worked best with 44-plus ring gauge cigars, making clean and smooth cuts. With the smaller ring gauges, especially below 40-ring gauge, sometimes the cutter tends to rip a little the cap towards the end of the cutting motion, and a little more attention is required.

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




Casual Cigars

"When cigars are not the focus."

There are times when we want the cigar to be the secondary element that enhances our enjoyment of something else. We have all seen photographs of sports stars smoking cigars after a big victory. We may smoke cigars casually while doing something else, or at least know someone who does. Activities like golfing, having a barbeque, reading a book on the beach, or just taking a nice leisurely stroll. These times usually call for a different cigar that doesn't demand our focus and attention; a casual smoking cigar. While smoking an Opus X or a Behike after winning the World Cup might give the impression of an excellent combination; we all know that the nuance and excellent flavor will not be fully appreciated in the moment because the cigar is not the center of attention. It is times like these that call for a good casual smoking cigar. So how do we find a casual smoking cigar? First it is important to define what we are looking for; a cigar that we enjoy the flavors of, something that isn't so complex that it requires all of our focus; often ti-



mes something more budget oriented, something that pairs well with the activity we intend to enhance, and a cigar that we can easily obtain.

Finding this cigar is as simple as keeping an eye out for it. Most cigar smokers branch out and smoke what is new or what is different but the focus is on finding that next "best" cigar; something that will sit in our humidor for the next special occasion or to impress our friends with all the amazing and rare cigars we have. Not everything you smoke is going to be a gem, usually people are looking for that amazing cigar with nuanced flavors and some complexity for the times in which the cigar is the main focus. A cigar that is reliable, enjoyable, yet not complex usually is not tipping the sca-


les for those times when the cigar is the center of attention. So those cigars are often overlooked in the future. However, if you are on the hunt to develop your collection of casual smoking cigars you should be thinking about it when trying out new or different cigars. While you may be disappointed in a particular cigar after devoting your full attention to it only to discover that it was, "boring," you might also have just found one of your most treasured cigars. Ask yourself: Did I like the flavors of this cigar? Were there any flavors I didn't like? Did it take any of my attention to taste those flavors? Is this cigar at the top of my budget? With enough trial and error, you might just find a cigar that can enhance your enjoyment of other activities and life without distracting your attention; something that you can mindlessly smoke.

If you truly love cigars but find yourself thinking that you don't have time to dedicate to enjoying a nice cigar, then it might be time to find that cigar that can enhance your enjoyment of some other activity. A useful tip when searching for the right casual cigar is to look at cigars that are at a slightly lower strength than you normally gravitate to. You will probably find a cigar with flavors you like but without the evolution or complexity you think is required for a perfect cigar. Do you avoid trying the standard product lines of some of the major manufactures? Maybe it's time to reevaluate those cigars. Those companies wouldn't still be around if their main product line wasn't reliable and enjoyable to someone.

Our constant search for the best possible cigar might just be blinding us to the cigar that is best for us. What good is that Padron Limited Edition TAA Exclusive or that Cohiba Talisman Edicion Limitada 2017 if we don't have the time to devote to giving it our full attention? Are we missing out on the full enjoyment of the world of cigars by only smoking when we have time to make the cigar the center of attention? While it is nice to have a humidor full of those rare and special sticks, our lives might just be that much more enjoyable if we devote some humidor space to those cigars that aren't the center of attention but can instead be enjoyed more often and used to elevate other activities in our lives. Finding some casual cigars might just teach you that you love cigars even more than already do. Finally, if you have some casual cigars you smoke often it may help you appreciate how truly special those "best" cigars are in comparison.

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Acrylic Cigar Humidors

A contemporary alternative.

s cigar lovers we understand the importance of proper storage to maintain our cigars in the best conditions. Recently, traditional wood humidors Thave not been the only option. Together with the old fashioned jars, a new type of humidor has been introduced to the market: the acrylic.

Acrylic humidors are typically made from polymethyl methacrylate (PMMA), a lightweight yet durable plastic known for its optical clarity and resistance to impact. The thickness of the acrylic walls varies depending on the model, but most high-quality humidors feature walls between 3mm and 5mm thick. These humidors often use silicone gaskets or precision-cut lids to ensure an airtight seal. The material's non-porous nature prevents the absorption of moisture, ensuring a consistent internal environment without the need for frequent adjustments.

Their advantages are much lower prices and the possibility to completely see through the humidor, even if the latter is something purely subjective. The main difference between the wooden humidor and the acrylic ones, lays in the way they interact with humidity.

A humidor made of wood can absorb moisture, while an acrylic one cannot. This could be a benefit if the humidor stays closed for longer periods of time, but it is not in the case of daily use, where the wood can reduce the humidity

Due to the fact that acrylic humidors cannot absorb moisture, the humidification system should be chosen carefully



(beads and humidity packs are the best options). It is fundamental to use a method capable of controlling humidity that won't only release moisture. It is basically the same principle used for jars.

Another consideration to not forget is to not place an acrylic humidor in direct sunlight, which will increase internal temperature, humidity fluctuations, and color discoloration of the cigar wrappers.

Acrylic cigar humidors offer a modern, low-maintenance alternative to traditional wooden humidors, making them an excellent choice for beginners and seasoned collectors alike. An acrylic humidor can effectively preserve your cigars' quality and flavor. Whether you are looking for a budget-friendly option or simply prefer a sleek, contemporary design, an acrylic humidor is a worthwhile investment for any cigar enthusiast.

PAIRINGS

rom the moment CigarsLover Magazine defined its pay-off, "Refine Your Taste", starting to accompany the tastings of cigars to those of spirits such as Whisky and Rum, we have set ourselves the problem of addressing the issue of cigar-spirits pairing. It is a thorny field, and often the results achieved are not what we expected and the pairing can give as much emotion as dissatisfaction if something goes wrong.

Cigar size: Robusto/Piramide/Toro. These are nowadays the most common formats, offering a representative smoking experience for the various producers and terroirs. Technically speaking, they do not present particular challenges, yet they still offer a satisfying aromatic experience and allow to appreciate the evolution of the smoke in parallel to the tasting of the spirits.

The Rating Scale: 100 points. We have chosen to keep it in the pairings as well, to simplify the comparison of ratings. In this case, however, this scale only evaluates the pairing, and not the individual qualities of cigars and spirits. If you have both excellent products, for example, but an unbalanced and inconsistent pairing, the rating will be low. On the contrary, the excellent marriage of two products of decent quality could give rise to a very positive evaluation.

The Tasting: Nose, Palate, Finish. Since our goal is to explore the complexity of a pairing, we thought it was appropriate to decline the experience in the three areas, following what is usual with spirits and that is also made in the cigar tasting, with pre-lit scents, tasting aromas and persistence.

The Comparison: 1 Cigar with 2 Distillates. We decided to start from the selection of a cigar, and ask specific questions such as: perhaps with this cigar is preferable a lower alcohol gradation? Maybe the ex-sherry oloroso barrels marry better than those moscatel with this cigar blend? Perhaps the excessive peat hides the more sophisticated notes of cigar? In order to answer the questions, we selected two spirits to investigate which one is the best cigar partner and why.

Two very risky pairings, one with a coastal highland whisky, mitigating the salty character with a rum finish, the second with a peated release, featuring a classy and sweet smoke.

Palate is much better, with the peanut brittle becoming more caramelized, yet creamy, also covered in delicious dark chocolate, with the right sweetness, now finally balanced. Finish is on wet sweet tobacco, between the pipe one and the one of cigars with "cabeza dulce".

Nice product, surprisingly different from the balanced, smooth and caramel-driven nose to the spicy palate, which boasts a nice and powerful experience. The palette is rather ample and interesting, yet the power of true rye can be perceived. Tasty. The shy nose of the bourbon is yet capable of making the tobacco more gentle and mellow, thanks to the caramel well integrating with the roasted nuts and burnt wood. Some hints of freshness remind of resin. The palates are more robust, with the spices playing well together yet becoming more masculine; the cigar however seems to have found its real nature this way, with the minor Nicaraguan component coming upfront, earthier and bolder. Finish is not very long and not the cleanest defined one, yet on burnt tobacco and caramel.

Subtle and well connected. The sip is more rounded, thus the cigar can re-discover its true earthy-woody character, darker than before, yet mellow and enjoyable. The spicy side is also darker, with toasted cardamom and cumin. Sophisticated, masculine, even middle-eastern at times.

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






Mhoba Distillery

The pioneering story behind the South African Rum maker.

hoba Distillery, located in Malelane, South Africa, is a craft distillery renowned for producing single estate rum from locally grown Nkomazi sugarcane. Founded by Robert Greaves, who engineered much of the distillery's equipment himself, Mhoba emphasizes a hands-on, artisanal approach. Their rums are crafted in the agricole style, utilizing pure sugarcane juice, and are free from additives, reflecting a commitment to purity and authenticity.

Quite a lot has happened from the first time we read about Mhoba in 2018. Can you tell how you got to this point and how much has changed from those early days?

Mhoba Rum was started by experimenting with the fermentation, distillation and maturation of our sugarcane juice

rums. We don't come from family or business with a history or pedigree in rum-making. We started from nothing and read and experimented a lot. I have always loved and been fascinated by flavour in food and drinks more than most people I know. When I decided to start making a spirit from our sugarcane, I built a small press to extract sugarcane juice and a small pot still and started distilling on a very small and experimental scale. I started trying different things in terms of fermentation and distillation and I learned a lot just by trying different ferments, distillations and still designs. We have also experimented with maturation in several different cask types, with particular focus on casks which have previously been used to produce great South African products. Over the last ten years we have discovered and continued with several methods and techniques which produce rums

we really like and those have formed what is now our core range of products. Although we already have a fairly wide range of rums, we are still a young distillery, and we still have a lot to learn and experiment with. I think we will always try new things and with time our core range and limited releases will continue to evolve as we discover new things, and we learn which rums appeal most to our market of rum and spirits fanatics.

Mhoba now has a solid core range with regular small-batch and limited releases. How have you been developing your bottling strategy?

Experimentation has always been a major part of what we do. I feel continued experimentation keeps the creative aspects exciting but the ultimate main aim behind this experimentation is to try to enhance the intense and nectareous flavours of our

rums. Through this experimentation we have already learned a lot and found several staple production methods. Examples of these distillates are our Select White marque which has been a part of our catalogue for quite some time as white rum and remains the backbone of many of our maturations. Similarly, our original high ester marque – GHE – also remains an integral part of our production. We have had great success with maturing our French Cask Rum in ex-red wine casks which we purchase from one of the oldest wine estates in South Africa. Our philosophy has, and always will be, to try new things and to learn as much as possible to produce the most authentic, exciting and intense rums that we can make using only our own sugarcane. As such, we have a basic foundation from which we hope to continue our growth into new and exciting things as we develop a more precise plan with regards to our

 bottling and production. We still have guite a few lessons to learn regarding our bottling strategy, and there are many inefficiencies when we bottle for large orders for clients such as La Maison Du Whisky. However, as we learn from these problems, we are getting closer to a system that works well and allows us to give our clients some great Mhoba as quickly as possible.

Mhoba's white rums are impressive. What is the most difficult aspect about making white rum and how did you manage to make it so special? What was the market response and how did you choose to communicate the value of your white rum vis-à-vis your equally unique aged rum? Initially, our focus was entirely on producing the best distillate we could make but our white rum was much milder as we focused on appealing to the local market. We are very lucky to have a growing export market for our rums and as my palette and our understanding of rum evolves, so too does the rum we make. Our white rum is a great representation of our sugarcane, particularly the Select White marque. This is due to our limited intervention in the natural fermentation of cane juice. We do not use any commercial yeast, nor any other additives in our rum making. Our fermentations are composed entirely of pure cane juice pressed from our own cane or a combination of pure cane juice, plus cane vinegar or vinasse which also results from our own cane juice. In other words, there is nothing else in our fermentations aside from cane juice or cane related products stemming from our own fields. As such, everything is derived from our sugarcane, making it a wholly unique and authentic single estate rum. Without doubt the most challenging aspect of procuring a great pure juice rum is the farming portion of the process. Very few people appreciate the difference in the expense and the amount of work required to produce a small scale, pure juice, single estate rum compared to producing a rum from purchased molasses. We have for some time now been using organic farming practises which also makes the growing of healthy sugarcane with high sugar content more expensive and labour intensive. Another critically important part of the making of really good rum is the understanding and natural ability to taste, select and blend specific cuts of different batches of rum to produce a blend with a certain style or profile. The overseas market response to our rums was and still is very positive, and many see our rum as a unique product with a general flavour profile somewhere between the character found in many Rhum Agricole's and the more robust and intense nature of heavy Jamaican rums. Being such a small distillery, we treasure our white rum, which is very much in demand by our clients and very much needed by us for the filling of casks to grow our maturation stocks. As such, we have placed quite a high value on our unaged liquid, because each drop is special and highly valuable to us.

What's Mhoba relationship to cask aging? Which were the most surprising casks you happened to use? How relevant is the peculiar South African climate of Mhoba's aging warehouses? Do you prefer to work on an impactful single cask or to build a more balanced cuvèe?

We practised very limited cask ageing and we matured



our first rums in glass demijohns with charred American Oak staves. This "Glass Cask" maturation is what inspired our Glass Cask expression which is still a staple in our core-range of products. Once I had built larger pot stills in 2016, we started traditional cask maturation. Our emphasis was and still is to prioritise the use of high-quality casks which have previously been used to produce great South African products. A natural source of casks is from our wor-Id-class wine industry in the Western Cape. Consequently, our most used casks would be ex-red wine casks from the Vrede en Lust Wine Estate. We also extensively use ex-whisky casks from the James Sedgewick whisky distillery which produces South African single malt and single grain whisky. We also have number of ex-Van Ryn's pot stilled brandy casks. In contrast to these local casks, we also use a good portion of ex-bourbon casks from the United States from distilleries such as Woodford Reserve, Jim Beam, and Wild Turkey. We also have some interesting and less conventional casks from various sources, such as ex-Ardbeg peated whisky casks, ex-marula brandy casks, and even some ex-rhum casks from the Caribbean. We are always on the hunt for something unique which we feel will marry well with our unique rums. Since we are very small, we can be very hands-on and give each cask specific attention when it is filled. Each cask is a creation of its own, filled with specific cuts or portions of distillate batches. Each fraction of our distillate gets tasted by either Shaldon (Engelbrecht, Distiller and General Assistant to the CEO) or myself in order to decide which cask or blend it should go into and in what quantities in order to create a very specific expression. Of course, we fill some casks in a similar fashion to create a foundation for our core expressions such as French Oak, Bourbon Cask, and so forth.

Mhoba is a "farm to table" distillery. Do you think that terroir is a fundamental concept in spirit-making? Do pedoclimatic differences really impact on sugarcane to a point you can genuinely appreciate? How much does it matter to have full control over production?

We do indeed practice a very hands-on method of creating rum, and most of what ends up in the glass we do ourselves - from farming the sugarcane, harvesting, juicing, fermentation, distillation, maturation, and finally bottling. I think the term and concept of terroir has certainly been misused by some spirit producers mostly for marketing purposes. I do also believe that a product which is produced purely from a near-naturally grown crop and contains no additives will have a natural character and flavour profile that is determined largely by many natural input factors that influence crops growth and how it transforms into the final product. This link between the genuine character of the product and the place in which it was made is terroir. As an example, we are the only farmers in our area applying only organic farming practises to sugarcane. This is essential because of the more natural growth of the sugarcane itself but even more critical because of its influence on the natural microbes that live on the sugarcane and are responsible for the natural fermentation of our sugarcane juice. During the juicing process the microorganisms that live on the outside of the sugarcane stalks are mixed with the juice released from




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the sugarcane and natural fermentation begins. If chemical herbicides and pesticides were applied to our cane and fields, it would dramatically affect the yeasts and bacteria that naturally live on our sugarcane and our fermentations would not be natural. If applied, organic farming coupled with wild or natural fermentation, generates a wholly unique experience which allows one to appreciate the products true provenance and genuine flavour, created by its source. As mentioned before, we are young and as such we are still experimenting with sugarcane planted in different fields and harvested at different times in the year. However, from what we have experienced small differences in the field can have notable differences on the final rum. Things such as climate and crop health obviously play a massive role, however even smaller differences between varieties of sugarcane can sometimes be noticeable. For us, having full control over production is also important in terms of principle. My core belief is to create a product that is entirely authentic. To achieve this, we keep our hands on the entire process so that we can ensure everything we do will create a product that can be appreciated as a true representation of its origin.

Mhoba has experimented with wild yeast fermentation for some years now. How difficult is it to manage that level of artisanal craft? Can it become a trend as in natural wines? Do you fear that it could actually turn more into a marketing strategy rather than a real innovation?

We have been practising only wild fermentation since 2021, and we have entirely omitted the use of commercial yeasts since then. We are quite fortunate that the wild yeast growing on the sugarcane that we harvest readily ferment the juice when it is made available. Often, fermentation can begin within 30 minutes from the point where the juice was crushed out of the cane stalks. We also have a great climate for fermentation, and things can happen guickly here. Thus, I cannot say that it has been particularly difficult to apply wild fermentation, the largest challenge would be the variability between batches. However, we see this as a good thing, since it allows for the opportunity to create new and interesting blends for casks and white rums. Yes, I surely believe that wild fermentation can become quite a large thing, particularly in the rum industry where intense and vibrant flavours are more welcome. There is a growing appreciation for things that are unique, and things that follow natural processes without intervention. For some it may be twisted into a marketing gimmick, but for small boutique producers it is a natural and authentic process which if used correctly can only add to the authenticity and uniqueness of a product. Wild ferments will not work for big brands that want repeatability to efficiently produce massive quantities of the same product. We produce very small quantities of a variety of different rums, so we are able to celebrate the uniqueness and difference between batches and use different batches in different products. This again requires intense personal input to the rum making process to taste the different cuts of different batches and decide which distillates are best suited to which ageing or white rum project. Using the process for the love of the process itself and the expression it produces will always result in a higher quality product, which is what we will always practice here at Mhoba Rum.

Whisky and Chocolate: the basics

Chocolate and whisky share many characteristics and high proof spirits can be well enjoyed away from the meal table.

hocolate is probably the most important and the most discussed pairing with whiskey. When we started our journey of cigar and whiskey pairing, we found very few outside contributions on the complexity and difficulty tasting with tobacco, while on the contrary every respected whiskey expert and every blog has tried to express an opinion on enjoying this fantastic spirit with the (Maya) Food of the Gods.

We believe there are mainly three reasons associated to this pairing popularity.

First, the fatty structure of chocolate is capable of enveloping the mouth for the same to better "accept" the intense aggression of the alcohol, which in whisky is 40% or higher. This "primer" is one of the best strategies to make sure the sip sensations are more mellow and rounded compared to a "dry" sip, providing a more refined, silky texture which is characteristic of the best of the spirits.

Second, chocolate and whisky share many product characteristics; for both the human contribution transforms basic products such as fruits and grains into sophisticated, complex, epicurean pleasures of life. Many stories are told, complex recipes exist, recently different varieties and agronomical experiments have been tried.

Last, desserts and high ABV spirits can well be placed at the end of a formal dinner or, even better, can be enjoyed away from the meal table, in a more "relaxed" environment such as a sofa or a smoking lounge, a location where it is easier to enjoy very interesting pairing such as whisky and cheeses.

Among the several personalities who have written about whiskey and chocolate, I would like to mention a couple whom we found very interesting in terms of contribution. Martine Nouet is a very passionate food and spirit writer, born in France, who spent more than



16 years living in Islay (and now planning to go back to France). We loved her idea of sensory pairing. We found a rather old interview with Maitre Chocolatier Michel Richart who, on top of several other creations, several years ago deeply investigated the flavors of chocolate, creating a line evidently representing the main aroma of those chocolate bars, separating them into 7 different categories (spicy, herbal, balsamic, roasted, fruity, floral, citrus).

This subdivision would be the ideal starting point for a more analytical investigation, however we doubt an initial start of the pairing journey will include cardamom or mango flavored chocolate with the different peats of the various declinations of an Islay Scotch. Yet, it was very nice to hear them talking about "love" or "marriage" pairing.

Another exercise worth mentioning is the one of lain Burnett, aka Highland Chocolatier, from Highland Perthshire, Scotland who, in his website, proposes several chocolate praline sets which are explicitly crafted to pair well with specific whiskies (e.g. a selection of Velvet Truffles and Pralines expertly chosen by the chef to pair perfectly with single malt whiskies from The Macallan including Macallan Amber, Macallan Gold, Macallan Sienna, and Macallan Ruby). The sets created by this awards winning expert are sold complete with pairing notes. We read the experience he proposed based on 4 Kilchoman whiskies, probably not the first ones we would select in terms of easiness of pairing.

We loved the complexity of the job of pairing highly aromatic and sophisticated pralines (lime, chilli, caramel, orange, clove and lemongrass are some of the aromas used in proposed Velvet Truffles), yet the most interesting aspect was the suggestion to go beyond the palatal part of the experience; though some chocolates are less aromatic to the nose compared to the normal whiskey experience, because of the difference in volatile aromatic compounds, it is very interesting

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to investigate how the two products interact also from a nose perspective. We will try this approach.

Reading what is available in terms of pairing suggestions from experts, the impression we get is that this exercise has been mainly an analysis of the aromatic palette of both the products; though details and often well done, this has brought most of the writers to suggest similarity pairing. As we have done for cigars and whiskeys, we would like to go deeper in our analysis, as in most of the cases we have seen this as a limiting factor, a way to enhance the experience, yet restricted in providing new dimensions to our senses, when not

Not necessarily, we want to follow the same identical aromas palette provided by the whiskey (e.g. to choose a lime aromatized chocolate for an Islay whisky which is providing a robust citrus profile with balsamic herbs and burnt herbs peat, a Caol IIa for example).

We are going to propose an integration, sometimes even a contrast pairing. This will result in the chocolate adding layers of complexity to the experience, not only enhancing and reinforcing the same aromas palette.

METHOD

- 1. Pour the whiskey, no ice, no water.
- 2. Nose the whiskey and detail your tasting notes.
- 3. Melt in the mouth a small amount of chocolate, covering the entire surface.
- 4. Nose the whiskey again, taking notes of the aromas evolutions / changes.
- 5. Drink a small sip of the whiskey and compare the tasting notes with the ones taken from previous experiences, indicating evolutions / changes.
- 6. Drink another small sip of the whiskey to determine how long lasting the effects of chocolate on whiskey are, before the whiskey goes back to standard aroma profile (baseline).

American Whiskies

100% Corn. Wheated and Creative Bourbons.

efore entering into more complex nuances and palettes, let us start from the most extreme of the products in terms of composition of the mash: the 100% corn products, dominated by the sweet quality of its base component, maybe of good and controlled quality such as a Bottled in Bond Mellow Corn. As expected, this highly rated whisky can be paired with tobaccos developing for the entire fruition dark, toasty, intense chocolate or even charcoal flavors, such as Cromagnon from RomaCraft, Reserva Privada, Double Connecticut from Alec Bradley or a Maduro by Maya Selva. This indication is however not an absolute truth. Sometimes balanced, creamy cigars such as the Great Wall GL3 N.3, a medium-bodied smoke centered on wood and coffee, allow the honey sweetness of the Mellow Corn to shine and create a jazz-style dance, with nuts drowned in orange honey and the elegant sensations of a cedar boiserie. Also in this case, experimenting may provide very interesting opportunities, beyond the limits of mere assumptions.

Hudson Baby Bourbon is another 100% corn based whisky, this time with very unique impressions of coconut and menthol freshness on top of the conventional bourbon aromas; its sophisticated yet pronounced sweetness does not fear dark Broadleaf powerhouses, rich in spices and pepper, such as a good Nica Rustica El Brujito, for a

complex, mellow integration still making the single parts very coherent. Balcones has several 100% corn releases, however we feel suggesting the Baby Blue Corn for cigar pairing, as the 46% ABV proves to be very efficient in quenching some of tobacco burnt notes with marshmallow and toffee notes, without being too aggressive.

A different chapter is represented by the very famous, classy, velvety wheated bourbons, one of the Holy Grails of pairings. For the moment we will leave aside very expensive and difficult to get releases such as Pappy Van Winkle series, as the age and the intensity of these products will be a tough match for any tobacco and, in addition, we are not sure any aficionado indulging into a glass of such would be in favor of enjoying it with anything else other than good company (book or friend). Some bargain deals are indeed available, such as a Larceny, or a Maker's Mark: these are not by mistake renown as some of the most successful pairing opportunities. Pick your favorite stick of great quality, a Cohiba of old batches, a Serie D N.4 from Partagas, a Plasencia Colorado Claro, and the spicy, woody and leathery components will shine on top of a perfect silky background, rich in butterscotch and demerara sugar.

Finally, in our analysis of American whisky we would appreciate to provide the right appreciation to the modern



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creativity of some Reservoir products which can test your limits, especially if they have some milky character such as a Holland's Milkman, but may well quench the fire of a piquant smoke such as the first releases of some Joya de Nicaragua Red, or the darkness of a Jose' Pepin Garcia Blue Label, up to some of AJ Fernandez sticks. Beware! This is a truly extracted spirit, with an intense and characterized taste and, even though the nose can pair well even with medium bodied tobaccos, the palates will not give off the same balance, with a very straight forward dominance of the whisky, which is exactly what we try to avoid. Much better to stick to Nicaragua and avoid sweet Dominicans...Inner Circle by Cavalier Geneve Figurado has been tested with the Reservoir Holland's Ghost, another rather unique release. The tobacco developed notes of hazelnut and wood, leather and herbs, sour cream, white pepper, for sure quite difficult to match the cherry candy aroma of the whisky. Did we find a true integration? Not really, the noses are complex yet disjunctive, sugar crust on hazelnuts and cherries on top of burnt wood. Palates are helped by the velvety texture of the spirit with strength added to the medium intensity tobacco profile, like red fruits added to the tobacco leather. The only warning we would appreciate to provide is that the usage of experimental, very extracted products in pairings is a true expert exercise; get first used with more traditional sensations before starting the journey into this post-modernism fractal potpourri of aromas... A few words on the millet-based products, such as Koval Bourbon, which features a quite high 49% of this grain. Get a good medium bodied cigar, with cedar and some level of freshness, helped by nuts and sweet spices. There are several products which are in line with this profile, from most of the modern Cubans to several Habano wrapper based recent productions. The overall fruition will be coherent and integrated, assonances will prolong the taste in your mouth, with a true reinforce of the pleasure.

Let us close the journey of the American whisky pairing with a product we have a true soft spot for: Legent Bourbon. This is a very unique spirit, resulting from the collaboration between two legendary figures such as Fred Noe, Jim Beam's master distiller, and Shinji Fukuyo, chief blender of Suntory. Fred has developed the mash recipe that first matures in toasted virgin barrels and then is divided for the finish between Californian red wine barrels and ex-sherry barrels. Finally, Shinji takes care of the blending process, bottling at 47% ABV. It pairs magnificently with different styles of aged tobacco, from a vintage Royal Corona of Bolivar, to a Davidoff Nicaragua Box Pressed, to several powerhouses by Fuente (an Opus X, a Don Carlos). However, despite the creativity, can this be considered or even called "bourbon" or even "American whisky"? We decided to leave the question with no answer, and sip & puff again...





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Margarita

A Timeless Celebration of Flavor

he Margarita is a cocktail that has secured its place in drink history as one of the most iconic and beloved concoctions worldwide. PREPARATION

To prepare the cocktail, begin by moistening the rim of a glass with a lime wedge, then proceed to dip the rim into a plate of salt to create a coated edge. Next, fill a shaker with ice and incorporate the tequila, lime juice, and orange liqueur. Shake the ingredients vigorously until the mixture is sufficiently chilled. Subsequently, strain the cocktail into the prepared glass over fresh ice and garnish with either a lime wheel or wedge.

Use Fresh Lime Juice for a vibrant, fresh flavor. Quality Tequila, ideally a blanco or reposado, delivers a smoother taste.

Lite Beers

What is their story and why cigar smokers should enjoy them more.

igar lovers are constantly looking for the perfect pairing of a fine smoke with the best drink. In recent years, a surprising contender has entered the realm of cigar pairings: low-alcohol beers. The cigar rings are removed and cigars are once again "dressed" with a new band, which simply bears a number. The same happens for the spirits, which are poured into little sample bottles, only showcasing a number and a possible indication, regarding the alcohol content, if the ABV is higher than 50%.

The products are then tested in a completely impartial way, in a blind tasting in which the tasters do not know which products they are trying.





The evaluations are then collected and CigarsLover Magazine team gets to work, calculating the averages and creating the final evaluations.

The tastings are compared to create the definitive review and the rating, expressed in a 100 scale.




